590 new cases of Covid-19 reported in Georgia over the weekend

ver the weekend, a total of 590 new cases of the Coronavirus was reported. On Saturday, there were 296 cases in the country, and on Sunday, the number of new COVID-19 cases was 294. On Saturday, 60 more people recovered from COVID-19, and on Sunday, the number of people recovered from the Coronavirus was 87.

"20 patients are critically ill, including 17 being on ventilator," Marina Endeladze, head of the boxing department at the Infectious Diseases Hospital, told reporters. According to her, more than 60% of the new cases are still from Adjara.

A significant share of new cases of the Coronavirus infections on September 27th still falls on Adjara. Out of 294 new cases, 193 have been identified in Adjara. 494 patients are treated in eight medical institutions of Adjara. Among them are 41 minors and 15 pregnant women. There are 22 patients in the intensive care unit.

A total of 26 patients were recovered from the COVID-19 in the region, and as the Health Ministry of Adjara says, a total of 600 beds have been allocated for COVID-19 patients in medical institutions of the region.

According to the Ministry of Health of Adjara, up to 4000 PCR tests were performed in Adjara during the last 24 hours. In order to prevent the spread of the Coronavirus, from September 26th, long-distance transport was restricted in Adjara. On September 25th, municipal transport was restricted as well in

Adjara.

According to the Deputy Minister of Health, Tamar Gabunia, the educational process in Adjara will be resumed and the traffic will be restored when the epidemiological situation stabilizes. According to official data, in the country, half of the daily confirmed cases of the virus come from Adjara.

eorgia honors the memory of those **X**killed in the armed conflict in Abkhazia. The state flag of Georgia is down on all administrative buildings in the whole territory of the country, the ministers lay wreaths at the memorial of the fallen heroes.

Tea Akhvlediani, State Minister for Reconciliation and Civic Equality visited the Heroes' Memorial.

"We respect the memory of the heroes who died in the fight for the unity and freedom of Georgia. It is this memory that makes today a very strong symbol of the unconditional importance of peace.

As for our policy, I believe that our efforts to further reconciliation will be strengthened," said Akhvlediani.

On the 27th anniversary of the fall of Sokhumi, Prime Minister Giorgi Gakharia visited the memorial and said that there was no winner in this war and that this war was a tragedy for all of us, Abkhazians and Georgians.

"Today is a day of great pain. We all understand that this is the gravest tragedy for Georgians as well as Abkhazians. There are no winners in this war and this war is a tragedy for all of us, Abkhazians

as well as Georgians. Today, 20 percent of Georgia's territory is occupied. Therefore, we must work every day to ensure that our children, together with Abkhazians - Abkhazians and Georgians, all of us together - can live in an economically strong, just, European, educated state. This is our duty to our children, and I am certain we will fulfill it," noted Gakharia.

The Prime Minister of Georgia Giorgi Gakharia, together with the Head of the Presidential Administration Natia Sulava and the Commander of the Georgian Defense Forces, Major General Giorgi Matiashvili, presented the children of Georgian Major General Geno Adamia, who died in the Abkhaz war, with the highest state award - the Order of National Hero. The title of National Hero was awarded to Geno Adamia by the President on the recommendation of the Prime Minister after his death.

The government administration stated that the public school N1 in Senaki will be named after Geno Adamia. Geno Adamia was appointed Deputy Commander of the 23rd Brigade in August 1992, and in September of the same year - Commander of the Brigade and Chief of the Sukhumi Garrison. His name is associated with almost all important and successful military operations to defend Sokhumi.

Today marks 27 years since the fall of Sokhumi. The military confrontation in Abkhazia began on August 14th, 1992. The conflict lasted for 13 months and 13 days. The battle for Sokhumi lasted for 11 days and ended with the fall of the city.

The loss of Georgian banks was reduced to \bigcirc 317 million



In January-August 2020, Georgian commercial banks suffered a total loss of 317 million.

In January-August 2020, Georgian commercial banks suffered a total loss of 317 million - according to a report published by the National Bank. According to the same document, the operating performance of financial institutions improved in August, as a result of which

the net loss, which amounted to 413 million in 7 months, decreased to 317 million in August.

If similar operating figures of banks are maintained until the end of the year, then it is possible that the financial sector will end 2020 with a loss of less than $\triangle 100$ million or a net profit of tens of millions of Lari.

As can be seen from the financial indicators, the main determinant of the existing losses is the accumulation of m1.2 billion in the expected credit loss reserve by banks. In total, Georgian commercial banks have reserved m1.22 billion in the 'possible asset loss' buffer, which reflects the amount of possible loan losses due to the expected crisis.

The President of the NBG also made a statement on the financial performance of banks. According to Koba Gvenetadze, it is expected that in 2021, the sector will return to the profit figures of previous years.

"Commercial banks carry out active appraisals and I hope that this amount will not be that much (\$\display\$1.2 billion), however even in the worst-case scenario, the banks maintain a fairly high level of capital adequacy and liquidity and their functioning is not threatened by any

problems. As for their losses, due to the reserves spent, they may end 2020 with

a small loss, although given the stable operating income, it is expected that they will regain their positions next year," said Gvenetadze.

As for operating activities, in the first 8 months of 2020, they received \$\displaystyle{\Phi}2.42\$ billion in interest income, which is 10% more than in the same period of 2019. More specifically, the income from loans to individuals was \$\displaystyle{\Phi}1.29\$ billion, which is an increase of 1% annually, while the income from loans to legal entities is \$\displaystyle{\Phi}910\$ million, which is an increase of 18%.

Non-interest income amounted to \$\display\$561 million, which is reduced by 2% on an annual basis. This subgroup includes banks' income such as commissions, fines and others. Revenue from commissions in the first eight months of 2020 was \$\display\$199 million, down 18% from the previous year, while revenue from fines and penalties was down 111% to \$\display\$28.8 million.

As for total expenditures, it amounts to 3.49 billion Lari, which is 36% more than in 2019. 1.2 billion Lari reserved for possible loan losses are included in these expenses. In addition to reserves, banks also increased interest costs. In particular, the interest rate on deposits increased by 157 million and amounted to \triangle 714 million, while the interest rate on other borrowed funds attracted by the banks themselves increased by 28% to \triangle 510.8 million.
