# Conference 'Glory to Ukraine!' starts in Tbilisi

The participants of the Tbilisi international conference "Glory to Ukraine!" visited the village of Odzisi near the occupation line.

Participants included David Kramer, a former high-ranking official of the United States State Department and director of global policy at the George W. Bush Presidential Center; MEP Anna Fotyga; Former US Ambassador to Georgia, Ian Kelly, and others.

The participants of the conference got acquainted with the situation at the occupation line in Odzisi.

The conference aims to maintain Georgia's priority place in the world and transatlantic agenda, to promote democratic progress and Euro-Atlantic aspirations.

This year's theme of the conference is "Glory to Ukraine!" The conference will discuss the new political and security reality created as a result of the war, the threats facing modern democracy, the future of European security, etc.

"On behalf of the Economic Policy Research Center (EPRC), the McCain Institute, and the George W. Bush Institute, we believe that this visit is very important as a reminder of what Georgia has experienced since 2008 and that it gives us lessons to learn from," David Kramer said.

We think it's important for our delegation to start our visit here as a reminder of what you live with every day. So, this is an expression of our support for Georgia, its sovereignty, and territorial integrity. We will continue to support Georgia so that one day Georgia will be reunited within its internationally recognized borders," added Kramer.

Kramer also spoke regarding the Russian propaganda narrative that the US and West are trying to drag Georgia into a war with Ukraine.

"Russian propaganda tries to blame the United States and Europe. Of course, it is absurd to say that the United States wants to involve Georgia in the war. Georgia has already had a war, it doesn't need another war," he said

"I think we have seen the solidarity expressed by the Georgian people towards Ukraine. We saw thousands of Georgians taking to the streets in support of Ukraine. I think there was some concern at the government level, but it is absolutely ridiculous for anyone to claim that the United States wants to drag Georgia into a war. Anyone who says this is repeating the Kremlin's propaganda," Kramer added.

According to Kramer, deoligarchization is as important in the EU recommendations as any other. He also added that he has expressed his views on the problems in this regard in the past and that his views have not changed. He thinks that deoligarchization is an issue that should be taken seriously. He also expressed his hope that "among other things, we will see Georgia move closer to candidate status and then, hopefully, to



EU membership."

"I think that Georgia is facing serious challenges, but one of the challenges is not the support of the Georgian people for joining the European Union and NATO. So, I think the country

is in the right place. I think there are steps that the government should take. I hope they will take steps so that Georgia continues this path towards Atlantic institutions. I hope the EU's position is a wake-up call about what needs to be done here. I think every step of the EU plan is important. This is not a menu to choose from. All recommendations of the European Union should be taken into account," David Kramer said.

## MEP Anna Fotyga visits Tbilisi

EP Anna Fotyga is visiting Tbilisi with the purpose of discussing ways to defeat Russian aggression with Georgian leaders.

The Polish politician visited the memorial of the deceased President of Poland Lech Kaczynski in Tbilisi and paid tribute to Kaczynski's memory.

"I am glad to be in Tbilisi to discuss ways to defeat Russian aggression. The victory of Ukraine is vital not only for Ukraine but also for Georgia, Poland, and the entire free world. I start every visit to Georgia by paying respect to the late Polish president, a great friend of Georgia, who understood very well the Russian threats." said Fotyga.



Fotiga met with the United National Movement to discuss issues Georgia is facing politically.

According to her, important and valuable issues for the country were discussed at the meeting.

"I met with representatives of the Georgian opposition, including members of the United National Movement." We talked about everything that is important and valuable for Georgia. Also about the war in Ukraine, because my field of specialization is defense and security", said Anna Fotyga.

According to Bacho Dolidze, a member of the "National Movement", the conversation was about the implementation of the 12-point plan.

"We talked about what the "Georgian Dream" is doing because it is actually sabotaging the entire process and doing everything to prevent the country from getting candidate status, which it will later blame on the opposition, civil society, or European partners. We have everything to do to force the "dream" to change the political vector. Their base is Russia, not the European Union, therefore this is the main issue", Bacho Dolidze noted.

#### Russian ship loaded with sanctioned oil enters Batumi port, the anti-corruption movement claims

The anti-corruption movement claims that a Russian-flagged ship loaded with sanctioned oil entered Batumi.

According to traffic reports, the tanker

says that the certificate of the sanctioned oil imported to Batumi will probably be falsified, after which the Russian oil will be exported as an unsanctioned product.


The movement calls on international organizations to take an interest in this issue.
