State Security Service Accuses USAID of Funding Training on the 'Revolutionary Scenario'

The State Security Service of Georgia accused the trainers invited as part of the USAID program of being connected to the training of NGOs and civil activists for "destructive actions planned in October-December."

According to the agency, the training participants have been instructed on how to take action against specific target groups, including the government, the Orthodox Church, the State Security Service, and other agencies

The State Security Service asserted that the trainers, who are affiliated with CANVAS are Serbian citizens.

"These individuals are associated with the 2003 revolutionary events in Georgia and have been linked to similar processes in Serbia, Ukraine, and other countries in various years. They actively taught methods for organizing protests and strategies for carrying out violent actions. They serve as key figures in CANVAS, with Sinisa Sikman and Slobodan Djinovic also being former members of 'Otpor,' which served as an equivalent to the Georgian organization 'Kmara' in Serbia.

The declared reason for the arrival of the Serbian citizens in Georgia was to conduct training sessions for cultural groups on the subject of 'strategic nonviolent fight.' However, the investigation uncovered that their purpose for being in Georgia extended beyond this initial claim. They sought to establish communication and provide training to young people and influential non-governmental organizations. These individuals were intended to form the core of planned de-



structive and illegal actions in Georgia scheduled for October to December of the current year," says the State Security Service

According to the agency, training took place on September 26 and the participants were taught "to create pickets and roadblocks, to destroy, and generally to overthrow the government," during which they provided a number of dramatic examples of revolutionary processes in Serbia for comparative analysis.

Based on the State Security Service's statement, "the conference held on September 26-29 with USAID funding was organized by CANVAS and the East-West Management Institute. During the four-day training, the representatives of the mentioned organizations and the so-called Civil activists were present."

Lisa Kovack, Acting Director of USAID's Office of Democracy, Rights, and Governance, responded to State Security Service on September 30, stating

that the 'Canvas' training was primarily focused on assisting representatives of the arts and cultural sector in effectively preserving the sector's independence.

"CANVAS is one of the civil society organizations that we support. The training's primary focus was to assist representatives of the arts and culture sector in effectively safeguarding the sector's independence. This training effectively addresses the issues that Georgians are interested in," Kovack stated.

CANVAS Georgia responded to the statement from the State Security Service of Georgia, which reads that the organization has observed pressure on the director of the organization and on activists associated with it.

In their statement, Canvas-Georgia is urging international human rights organizations and individuals who are supportive of democracy and human rights protection in Georgia to prioritize this issue when they engage with various private and public institutions operating within Georgia. The organization believes that such support will be of significant assistance to activists who are dedicated to enhancing democracy in Georgia.

According to the organization, threats against the director of Canvas-Georgia, Giorgi Meladze, began even after the March protests. The campaign

of threats continued on September 18 when the State Security Service announced that the organization was allegedly involved in an organized conspiracy aimed at overthrowing

the current government.

"Ten days after the statement was published, on September 29, the State Security Service summoned Slobodan Dinovic and Sinisa Sikman, members of 'Canvas' who had arrived in Tbilisi, as well as Jelena Tancic,

an employee of 'Canvas's' Belgrade office, for interrogation. After the interrogation, they left Georgia within a few hours without providing an official comment because the investigation was classified as a state secret, and participants were obliged to

not disclose any information.

Canvas-Georgia assesses the mentioned cases as pressure on the head of the organization, on the activists who collaborate with the organization, receive education, and disseminate knowledge about strategic non-

violent campaigns."

"We call on international human rights organizations, supporters interested in the protection of democracy and human rights in Georgia, to pay attention to the mentioned fact and to consider this topic as one of the priorities when interacting with relevant private and public structures and institutions operating in Georgia. We believe that such support will significantly help activists interested in strengthening democracy in Georgia," the statement reads.

"Passing this milestone reaffirms the EBRD's unwavering commitment to supporting your country," Renaud-Basso told Zelenskyy, his government and Ukraine's business community. "Our partnership is also a testament to the resilience and potential of Ukraine's economy, its financial and business sectors, and the courage of its entrepreneurs and people."

The EBRD, Ukraine's biggest institutional investor, has committed to deploy at least Euro3 billion of financing in Ukraine's real economy in 2022-23 and to play a key role in future recon-

struction. According to the Bank, its primary focus is on maintaining energy and food security, restoring infrastructure, providing trade finance and supporting the private sector.

In 2022, the Bank deployed Euro1.7 billion in Ukraine – more than one-tenth of the Bank's total investments across its regions – and mobilised a further Euro200 million from partner financial institutions.

With 2023 financing reaching the Euro1.2 billion mark, the Bank is on track to meet its Euro3 billion commitment very shortly, says a press release by EBRD.
