Parliament Chairman Participates in the NATO-Georgia Commission Meeting

Chairman of the Parliament of Georgia, participated in a meeting of the NATO-Georgia Commission (NGC) at the level of permanent representatives held on December 6 at NATO headquarters in Brussels.

According to the press service of the Parliament of Georgia, during the meeting, the Chairman of the Parliament provided detailed information to the ambassadors of the member states of the Alliance about the ongoing democratic reforms in the country and emphasized the progress achieved by Georgia in several areas.

In his speech, he also addressed the significance of enhancing cooperation between NATO and Georgia, highlighting the challenging geopolitical situation in the region. This includes Russia's military aggression against Ukraine and its impact on both Georgia and the broader Black Sea region.

"At the NATO Washington summit, the Georgian side unequivocally emphasized the necessity of Georgia's accession to the alliance. In response, the Allies welcomed the progress achieved by the country on the path of European and Euro-Atlantic integration. They under-

scored the qualitatively highlevel relations between Georgia

and the Alliance, emphasizing the importance of continuing the successful implementation of planned reforms

I was talking about the fact that in the wake of the progress of integration in the European Union, it is important for NATO to share the approaches that the European Union has recently

when we are given clear expectations in the form of recommendations. These recommendations are then followed by appropriate decisions when we make progress in this or that recommendation.

It is important that NATO adopts these approaches and communicates to us the exact criteria and expectations. Also, it seems that when there is progress on these issues, it will be followed by decisions from the side of NATO," Papuashvili said.

Kaladze Says Orbán Has Consistently Shown Hungary as a Key Supporter of Georgia's **European Integration**



The Mayor of Tbilisi, Kakha Kaladze addressed the opposition's criticism of Hungarian Prime Minister Viktor Orbán's stance on Ukraine joining the European Union.

According to Kaladze, Orbán has consistently shown Hungary as one of the most important supporters of Georgia's European integration journey.

He stated that the opposition opposes everyone who supports Georgia, adding that their main goal is to prevent Georgia from becoming a candidate country for European Union membership. Kaladze accused the opposition of attempting to delay crucial steps in Georgia's journey to join the EU:

"Do we not know the actions of the opposition? Their main message is that Georgia should not attain the status of a candidate country for EU membership. Years ago, they also did everything to delay the process of visa liberalization and avoided signing an association agreement. As for Orbán, he has repeatedly shown through his statements that Hungary is indeed one of the most significant supporters of our country on the challenging path of European integration.

From what I observe of the opposition, they oppose anyone supporting Georgia as much as possible. They are actively working against it, even in the process of attaining the status, but their efforts will be in vain. The government of Georgia is dedicated to achieving this status, implementing all necessary reforms in the coming years, and taking appropriate steps to expedite the process of European integration," said Kaladze.

President Zourabichvili's Actions Harm Georgia's Interests, says Shalva Papuashvili

Shalva Papuashvili, the Chairman of the Parliament of Georgia, criticized President Salome Zourabichvili's actions, deeming them detrimental to the national interests of the country.

Papuashvili responded to inquiries regarding Irakli Kobakhidze's statement, suggesting a significant likelihood of Zourabichvili "resigning and participating in the elections one or two months before they take place."

He believes that Zourabichvili's steps are harmful to Georgia's interests, including national and security interests. According to Papuashvili, given Zourabichvil's actions against the national interests of Georgia and her alignment with the opposition's agenda, it is difficult to rule out potential negative consequences.

"We can see that after Salome Zourabichvili violated the constitution, she deliberately left the constitutional framework. Her steps are harmful to the national interests of Georgia, including security interests, and therefore nothing can be ruled out. It is a fact that Salome Zourabichvili is acting against the national interests of Georgia and is clearly acting according to the agenda of the opposition. It will be difficult to rule things out." Papuashvili stated.



More than 650 new Young European **Ambassadors selected** amid record applications

The EU NEIGHBOURS east programme has welcomed 657 new Young European Ambassadors (YEAs) to its existing network, selected among a record 2,126 applications from young candidates from the EaP coun-

tries, EU Member States and the UK. The network now counts a total of 1,162 active YEAs.

After an intense selection procedure for assessing the applications, 74 new YEAs were picked for Armenia, 114 for Azerbaijan, 14 for Belarus, 98 for Georgia, 108 for Moldova, 121 for Ukraine, and 128 for the EU/UK.

The newcomers, aged 16-26, will now take part in the YEAs Academy, which offers them training to prepare for their tasks ahead.

The Young European Ambassadors (YEAs) initiative is a nonpolitical, voluntary, vibrant communication network connecting and building bridges of friendship among young people from Armenia, Azerbaijan, Belarus, Georgia, the Republic of Moldova, Ukraine and the EU Member States and the United Kingdom. The aim of the network is to raise awareness about the EU's cooperation with its Eastern partner countries, showcase the tangible results of this cooperation, contribute to

policy dialogue on various topics, help increase civic activism and work together for a better future.

Between January and October 2023, the Young European Ambassadors have taken part in 821 activities across the region and in the EU. Face-to-face activities this year have reached 52,000 people, while online reach has risen to more than 3.8 million.
