Foreign Minister Darchiashvili Discusses Ambassadorial Meetings in Berlin on European Integration

Georgian Foreign Minister Ilia Darchiashvili stated in Germany that the goal is for every ambassador working in EU member states and various organizations in Europe to be fully informed about the issues, challenges, and opportunities facing Georgia.

Darchiashvili explained that during his meeting with Georgian ambassadors in Europe and the United States, discussions focused on the opportunities and challenges the country faces in the context of European integration.

Georgian Foreign Minister Ilia Darchiashvili stated that Germany is a key supporter of Georgia's European integration and that they have mobilized strong support from various EU member states, including Germany. He mentioned that last year, they held a conference of ambassadors in Berlin to discuss future steps for European integration, and this tradition continued this year with similar consultations in Berlin, attended by the Prime Minister of Georgia. The discussions focused on the opportunities and challenges Georgia faces in its path toward European integration.

Darchiashvili emphasized the importance of keeping ambassadors fully informed about the country's issues, challenges, and opportunities to turn challenges

opportunities that we need to use, in order to turn challenges into opportunities and continue our European integration. We are very optimistic in this direction. Ambassadors are given the opportunity to ask the Prime Minister questions, receive answers, and this is a very healthy, open discussion, which is a continuation of our tradition," said the Minister of Foreign Affairs.

Economy Minister Emphasizes 'Responsible' Selection of Private Partner for Anaklia Project

In response to media inquiries about the Anaklia port project, the Minister of Economy of Georgia, Levan Davitashvili said that there is a constant dialogue with strategic partners. Davitashvili stated he is directly involved in this process to ensure that the partners have complete information about the project.

As you know, there were talks about one company. We also have another company in the consortium - China Harbor Investment. as well as several subcontractors, and we also consider the involvement of several important, highreputation, including the Chinese international shipping line - in general, it will be a complex ecosystem, where a consortium made up of many partners will cooperate with the state so that we get the highest possible quality development of this port and Georgia's strategic and commercial interests will be taken into account as much as possible," Davitashvili said.

According to the Economy Minister, the process of selecting a private partner is being carried out with maximum responsibility. He mentioned that it will likely take several more weeks of dialogue to clarify the issues he has discussed publicly. This is to ensure that the proposals received from the consortium fully meet the tender requirements.

"Probably, it will take several more weeks of dialogue to clarify the issues I talked about, including publicly, so that the proposals received from the consortium are fully in line with our tender requirements. If this happens, of course, we will announce the winner and continue to cooperate with them and work on an agreement," said the Minister of Economy.

Davitashvili also provided details about the start of marine works in Anaklia. He explained that the Belgian international engineering company, serving as a consultant to the state on the construction aspects, is currently clarifying the details, a process expected to take about one or two weeks.

"Within the framework of the Anaklia port project, work is being carried out intensively, and naturally, we want quality results to be achieved in both directions," said Davitashvili.

He emphasized that such double standards are unacceptable.

Kobakhidze expressed respect for the US ambassador and hoped she would positively contribute to Georgian-American



Prime Minister of Georgia Irakli Kobakhidze stated that it is a double standard to criticize Georgia for deepening economic relations. He pointed out that fair and just evaluations are essential for healthy relationships and noted that Georgia often faces unfair assessments. He claimed that Georgia's actions serve its national interests and that the country will continue on its current path despite these criticisms, as double standards and injustice are counterproductive to improving relations with partner countries.

"I think that there is an absolutely unfair attitude on the part of specific partner countries. In fact, everyone knows that China is one of the most important trade partners for the European Union and the United States of America. When we hear Georgia's criticism for deepening economic relations with China, it is a double standard, and for us such a double standard is absolutely unacceptable. An important and necessary condition for healthy relationships is justice, fair evaluations. Unfortunately, we often hear unfair assessments regarding the steps taken by our state. These steps serve the national interests of our country, and therefore, naturally, we will continue to act in the relevant direction in the future. Double standards and injustice are counterproductive for the improvement of relations between us and our partner countries," said Kobakhidze.
