Zourabichvili took to social media to express concerns about schools allegedly asking children to provide their parents'

children for such data, this is a violation of personal data! A child should not give his par-

personal data. "If schools ask ents' personal number! The identification of these schools is interesting!" Zourabichvili

In response, the Ministry of Education, Science, and Youth of Georgia refuted the President's claims, stating that the accusations that children's personal data is being collected for specific purposes "is a lie and does not correspond to the truth." The Ministry described the distribution of such disinformation as "a deliberate action aimed solely at discrediting the education system."

The Ministry explained that schools periodically update contact information for parents or legal representatives, including phone numbers, email addresses, and residential addresses. This practice is intended to ensure "quick and easy communication with the parent/legal representative, if necessary."

They emphasized that the collection, storage, processing, analysis, and administration of data within the general education management information system complies with the requirements of the Law of Georgia "On Personal Data Protection." The system is authorized to receive and use personal data from other public entities under the Ministry's jurisdic-

The Ministry urged individuals to refrain from spreading misinformation, stating, "We call on specific individuals to refrain from spreading disinformation, which serves to deliberately mislead the public."

Kakha Kaladze Slams EU Criticism, Compares Union to **Soviet Union**

Kakha Kaladze, the general secretary of the ruling Georgian Dream party and mayor of Tbilisi, heavily criticized the European Union during a recent statement regarding discussions on Georgia's status at the meeting of EU foreign affairs ministers in Luxembourg.

"What does it matter whether it is the status of the Soviet Union or the European Union?"

Kaladze remarked, emphasizing that Georgia's fight for independence was rooted in a desire to be free from external control. "What did we fight for? To be independent. We were in the Soviet Union and we didn't want to be; we were all stamped states, we all had the same line. We wanted to be free and independent."

He further argued that the current treatment of Georgia by

Georgian Prime Minister Irakli Kobakhidze has criticized the opposition's proposal for forming a technical government, calling the idea a "farce". Kobakhidze said that the suggestion is impractical and could have negative consequences for the country.

According to the Prime Minister, implementing a technical government would halt the country's progress for a year and potentially increase the risk of Georgia becoming involved in wider re-

opposition's plan would lead to disorder and instability:

"Actually, you know that our rating is about 60%. Under such conditions, talking about an opposition technical government is a farce. Elections will be held as usual. In November or early December, the first session of Parliament will take place, and a normal government will be formed, not the so-called technical government, which ensures the development of the country.

war. According to the available information, she died while being transferred to Moscow from a prison in Taganrog.

"Our thoughts are with her family, friends and colleagues," said Borrell. "Her fate is a tragic reminder of the many thousands of persons detained in occupied Ukrainian territories and Russia, as well as the repression imposed by Russian authorities, also in Russia."

Borrell, on behalf of the EU, demanded "a thorough and independent investigation" that clarifies all the circumstances of Victoria Roshchyna's death "as soon as possible". He also said that by arbitrarily detaining Roshchyna in the temporarily occupied Ukrainian territories in August 2023, the Russian authorities assumed full responsibility for her safety, health and physical integrity.

"The EU remains deeply concerned about Russia's ongoing harassment, intimidation and violence against journalists and media workers covering war zones and frontlines. For them, safety and protection must be ensured at all times," Borrell said.

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
