

ISFED Reports Fake and Suspicious Profiles on CEC's Facebook Page

The International Society for Fair Elections and Democracy (ISFED) has reported 7 fake and 15 suspicious profiles involved in a support campaign on the Facebook page of the Central Election Commission (CEC) of Georgia.

ISFED reports that these inauthentic accounts, some of which appear to steal identities, are coordinated and have repeatedly commented on posts by the CEC. The comments are often identical or very similar across different accounts.

According to ISFED, these fake profiles praise the electronic technologies used in the 2024 parliamentary elections and the voting process while downplaying the significance of observed violations, presenting them as disinformation. In addition to defending the CEC and chairman, its Giorgi Kalandarishvili, the profiles attack opposition parties, civil society organizations, and promote anti-Western views. They also interact with accounts critical of the CEC, often responding with offensive content.



ISFED notes that the use of fake profiles in the CEC support campaign was also evident during the 2018 presidential elections, with links to the Russianrun agency Newsfront. Inauthentic accounts were used to promote a positive narrative about the administration, though their activity was less intense on election days. These accounts became more active in late October, following the growing discussion of election violations.

ISFED also points out that while they cannot verify the photos posted on suspicious accounts, there are clear indicators of inauthenticity. Many of these profiles share identical posting times, contain only 2-3 photos published on the same day, and have minimal interactions. Some of the profiles are newly created, which suggests they were designed specifically for the campaign.

ISFED continues to raise concerns over the impact of such inauthentic activity on the electoral process and urges further scrutiny of social media interactions during the election period.

Zurab Japaridze Calls for Mass Protests to Prevent GD from Legitimizing Parliament

Zurab Japaridze, leader of the Girchi-More Freedom Party and Coalition for Change, has outlined a series of steps to prevent the Georgian Dream (GD) from legitimizing the new parliament following the October 26 elections. In an interview with Formula TV, Japaridze emphasized that mass protests will be needed to block GD from officially forming the parliament.

Japaridze pointed to specific deadlines in the coming month that will determine he political process. Currently, the focus is on filing lawsuits related to detected cases of electoral fraud, with protests targeting the courts and the Central Election Commission (CEC). He stressed the importance of preventing the CEC, led by Chairman Giorgi Kalandarishvili, from finalizing the election results, which Japaridze claims are influenced by GD leader Bidzina Ivanishvili. The final vote tally must be announced by November 21, and Japaridze warned that this period will be crucial for blocking the CEC's actions. After the CEC's final protocol, attention will shift to the Georgian president, who under the constitution must convene Parliament within 10 days. Japaridze believes the president will refuse to do so, setting the stage for the next phase: mass protests to prevent the GD from legitimizing the new parliament. He called for other political parties to boycott Parliament, daily cooperation with international partners to prevent the results from being recognized abroad, and a large rally to physically block GD MPs from entering the building. Japaridze warned that if the GD succeeds in legitimizing the new parliament, it will rapidly implement policies like the foreign agents law and intensify political persecution. He also cautioned that many of the citizens currently protesting will be forced to leave the country. According to Japaridze, this is the only realistic plan to prevent Georgia from following a path similar to Belarus.

The Central Election Commission (CEC) rejected complaints from opposition parties and the Georgian Young Lawyers' Association (GYLA), who had called for the annulment of results from 73 constituencies due to violations of confidentiality. CEC Chairman Giorgi Kalandarishvili dismissed the complaints as baseless.

CAREC Ministers Endorse Climate Change Action Plan and 2030 Strategic Priorities, Launch Regional Climate Fund

STANA, KAZAKHSTAN (8 November 2024) — Member countries of the Central Asia **Regional Economic Cooperation** (CAREC) Program have endorsed a new Climate Change Action Plan (CCAP) and launched the CAREC Climate and Sustainability Project Preparatory Fund (CSPPF) to strengthen regional collaboration on climate resilience, lowcarbon growth, and sustainable development.

The endorsement took place at the 23rd CAREC Ministerial Conference held today in Astana. Ministers also endorsed the Midterm Review of the CAREC 2030 Strategy, which recommended reinvigorating regional cooperation and enhancing operations toward climate-smart development and regional public goods, among others.

"The approval of the CAREC Climate Change Action Plan and the establishment of the Climate and Sustainability Project Preparatory Fund are significant milestones in our collective efforts to address climate change," said Asian Development Bank (ADB) President Masatsugu Asakawa, who delivered a keynote address at the conference. "By working together, we can build resilient infrastructure, develop early warning systems, and create a greener future pow-
